Pre-Start Checks and Safety

- Road User Charges (if applicable) are current
- Dangerous Goods Licence (if required)
- Log Books are used (if applicable)
- Driving Hours, On Duty Hours and Days off are adhered to
- Over-width and/or over-weight requirements are met
- Speed limits are adhered to at all times

All NZTA infringements are the hirer's responsibility

- All panel and glass damage is not covered by Hirepool's Damage Waiver Insurance

Daily Checks

 It is the driver's responsibility to carry out daily checks on all fluid levels, controls, lights, tyres etc

When Operating

As this instruction sheet is generalised on all our vehicles please ensure you are briefed fully on the particular vehicle you are hiring

- Always drive in a manner as per the New Zealand Road Code and have courtesy for other road users
- Always check vehicle load ratings and ensure you work within them (this includes Combined Maximum Gross Weight. E.g. vehicle, trailer and its load)
- When carrying a load always ensure it is securely fastened so it can't shift around while the vehicle is moving. If possible put the load against a head or side board. Place heavier items at the bottom, on trailers position loads as close to the axle as possible and avoid placing heavier loads towards the rear of the trailer
